Peace-Liard Regional Juried Art Exhibition opens Apr. 5

Peace Gallery North will be packed with the artwork of 70 artists from across the region for this year's Peace-Liard Regional Juried Art Exhibition.

Starting Apr. 5, the annual competition will feature paintings, drawings and photography to textiles, pottery and antler carvings. But the challenge, says host coordinator Barb Daley, is squeezing it all into limited space.

"We finally had to say, 'Look, that's our maximum number, we can't fit any more work," she said. "But we were hoping for the 150 (pieces) to commemorate B.C.'s 150th birthday. We thought that would be kind of a cool connection."

Artists entered work into three different categories: the first was open, which has no real limitations; the second class project, which is work that was done during an instructional class, and the third is start for kids aged 13 to 18.

Amy teBulte, who is entering the show for the first time, said she's excited to be a part of such a diverse artistic event.

"I'm very excited. I just moved here about a year and a half ago, so it's the first work I've shown since moving here, and I can't wait to see the other pieces that are entered," said teBulte, who draws the inspira-

tion for her hard-lined portrait paintings from artists like Andy Warhol.

The artwork entered will be critiqued by Alberta artist Carrie Klukas. She will decide on the award winners, as well as choose 12 to be part of a regional calendar for 2009.

There are three awards that will be handed out, including the distinguished award for \$1,000, the recognition award for \$500 and the student award for \$200, which are all sponsored by EnCana.

Each year, the show rotates between Fort St. John, Chetwynd, Dawson Creek, Tumbler Ridge, Hudson's Hope and Fort Nelson.

Last year the show was held in Fort Nelson, and next year it will be in Tumbler Ridge.

The Peace-Liard Regional Juried Art Exhibition opens at Peace Gallery North in the North Peace Cultural Centre on April 5 at 7 p.m. and will run until May 2.

WAX WORK

Ancient painting method introduced to artists

h A group of Peace region artists had the chance to experiment with an cancient art form over the weekend in conjunction with the Peace Liard Regional Juried Art Exhibition.

The workshop was an added bonus for artists who entered the exhibition, and was led by juror Carrie Klukas.

"I picked up this medium a couple years ago, and I just get so excited when I work with it, and that's usually a good indication that I should be doing it," said Klukas, who said she was happy to be able to share the encaustic medium with everyone.

Encaustic, the practice of painting drawing with pigmented wax, is one of the oldest art forms in the world, dating back 3,000 years.

The steps include melting the wax, adding pigments, painting the mixture onto a hard surface, and then using heat to fuse the wax to that surface.

It is not just limited to melted wax; paper and other objects can be collaged between layers of wax to give the piece more depth.

"It's such a diverse medium that it gives artists an opportunity to try everything, and they can decide if they incising, or building up, or collage, and then they can try and incorporate it into their own work," Klukas said.

Participants were given a brief history of what encaustic is, then given free reign over several stations to experiment.


Beeswax was melted inside tin cans on hot griddles, and then the artists painted the melted wax onto boards.

Each layer of wax had to be fused to the previous layer for adding another layer, which was done with irons, heat guns, and a 200-watt light bulb.

Once the wax takes on a glossy heen, but is not completely melted, it is fused. Participants discovered something new with every layer.

"My encaustic is, in my opinion, not going so well," laughed Ilona Theal as she scraped away at the layers for her encaustic piece.

"But I can see there's a lot of potential for this medium – there's a lot you can do with it."

On Saturday morning, it was standing room only for the artist's walk-through with the juror. The entire exhibit was critiqued, entry by entry.

Artists from around the region enjoyed the opportunity to hear specific feedback, from a

professional from outside the region. Encouragement was interwoven with constructive criticism, and artists had time to ask questions.

There was a real spirit of community as people from all corners of the region gathered to celebrate art in the Peace Liard. At the same time, the cultural center was also hosting the B.C. Festival of Performing Arts, so the

place was "hopping."

That evening, the Peace-Liard Regional Juried Art Exhibit officially opened, but it was not the night to actually see anything. Between 200 and 250 people were milling around, very carefully, schmoozing and sipping wine and

nibbling cheeses.




The Exhibit runs until May 2, and we won't see it here again for another six years, so "get along, little doggie."



A group of 20 or so artists gathered in the ball-room at the Northern Grand on Sunday, and they "had a ball," indeed. Carrie Klukas. an Alberta

abstract-impressionist artist who juried the Regional Juried Art Exhibit, taught an Introductory Encaustic workshop for Peace Liard entrants.

A hearty soup and sandwich lunch was followed by a lecture on the history of encaustic painting. An ancient technique, encaustic involves painting with melted wax mixed with pigment. Most of us didn't know what encaustic was, or even how to pronounce it. By the end of the day, however, there were 30 or 40 small paintings produced, and a lot of interest generated in this exciting medium. The ballroom looked a lot like CDC Playgroup, with everyone experimenting with colourful melted wax, and using all kinds of interesting materials.
