

Bright Nights In June

Applause will ring in June 1992 when the North Peace Cultural Centre officially opens its doors for business after seven years of development. The Official Grand Opening on June 26 and 27 is appropriately named "Bright Nights in June". The bright lights of the Gala Opening will focus on the hard working committees of the North Peace Cultural Society that have shown fortitude and tenacity in finishing the sometimes controversial facility in Fort St. John.

The Cultural Centre began in 1985 with a \$1,000,000 Provincial Expo Legacy grant followed by a \$500,000 Federal DOC Grant. Phase I included the purchase of the vacant Hudson Bay building in the heart of Fort St. John and the structure altered to accommodate 40,000 square feet. Private and corporate contributions of \$1,000,000 along with a provincial GO BC grant of \$650,000 were not quite enough to complete the construction of Phase II.

The last of the required capital was arranged through the City of Fort St. John with the assistance of the District of Taylor. Final construction of the \$4.2 million building began in 1991, three years after Phase I.



The North Peace Cultural Centre has the first performance theatre for the North Peace. The 400 seat theatre will be open for conferences, public meetings, concerts, plays and touring groups.

The community's Public Library will offer first class services available in the Cultural Centre. Local contributions by the Bingo Association and the Kinsmen have assured proper equipment in this new expanded space.

The Public Art Gallery is scheduling touring exhibitions and art shows and competitions. The unique Gallery Shoppe will be a popular stop for tourists as well as residents.

The Artspace equipped with a 1300 square foot sprung wood floor plus equal carpeted space will be available for community functions, wedding receptions, and daily classes for pre-schoolers, youngsters and adults.

The North Peace Cultural Centre was designed for versatility and flexibility by Howard/Yano Architects of Vancouver. The Building Committee has kept the Phase II construction on time and on budget. The spot-light will shine on the North Peace Cultural Centre on 100th Street and 100th Avenue (the 100% corner) in Fort St. John, British Columbia on June 26 and 27, 1992.

FSJ Children Festival Shaping Up


The first Fort St. John Children's Festival featuring Charlotte Diamond of Vancouver and Canadian Conent of Winnipeg will be held in the Fort St. John

The celebration year of 1992 is now underway, and the festivities are already pulling people out of the winter doldrums.





Stage North's next production is "Jennie's Story", a drama by Canadian playwright Betty Lambert, directed by Kevin Truscott. Stage North has been invited to perform "Jennie's Story" at the International Amateur Theatre Festival in Monterrey, Mexico. The club will represent Canada at this international event, which includes groups from the United States, Norway, Germany, Czechoslovakia, Colombia and the Dominican Republic as well as a number of Mexican groups. The festival takes place from March 16th to March 22nd with Stage North's production "Jennie's Story" opening the festival on March 16th.

The members of the cast include Marian Truscott as Jennie, Cindy Rost as Molly, Bernie Cardin as Harry, Kevin Peterson as Father Fabrizeau, with the role of the mother, Edna, split between two actresses, Sandy Blatchford and June Ainsworth.

RCMP Concert Band Returns by Popular Demand


The Concert Band of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police returns to Fort St. John on May 4 in celebration of the 50th Anniversary of the Alaska Highway.

Art Doesn't Cost ... It Pays

There's a perception that the arts are a cost to society, always requiring subsidies and grants to produce their music, films, plays, books, dances, etc. Not a bit of it is true, said Statistics Canada in its 1986 report, Cultural Statistics: The Economic Impact of the Arts and Culture Sector.

"The arts are not just deficit-ridden spongers," the report said firmly.

GDP (gross domestic product) measures the value of production in Canada. In 1981 (latest figures then available), arts and culture accounted for \$5.2 billion of the GDP, StatsCan found, 1.7 per cent of the \$314.5 billion total. That was more that tobacco, rubber/plastics, textiles, clothing, and furniture and fixtures, and about the same as the metal and mines, food and beverage, electrical power, gas/utilities, and accommodation/food service industries.

Primary and intermediate spending by arts and culture groups totalled \$9.1 billion, with \$12.7 billion of direct, indirect, and induced impact on GDP, or four per cent. (Direct impact results from direct expenditures by the arts and culture sector. Indirect impact comes from interactions with other, supplying businesses, leading to indirect demand for goods and services from other industries; induced impact reflects the re-spending of wages and salaries earned in arts and culture and in supplying industries.)

Every dollar spent by arts and culture groups had \$2.50 of direct, indirect and induced impact on the GDP. That's the multiplier effect. Every job multiplied into 2.4 jobs. The performing arts were higher \$2.70 of impact for \$1, with jobs multiplied by 2.5.

These multiplier ratios are "Still in the right ballpark" in 1991, Michel Durand, the report's author, said in an interview from Ottwawa. Other studies refer to an impact of three to five times an arts group's budget.

The Statistics Canada report began, however, with a warning: "To substitute the economic value of the arts for their creative and spiritual value would be a severe distortion. However, to ignore their economic importance, and especially their usefulness in promoting balanced economic growth, would also be a serious mistake."

Artspace Classes Into New Space

The dream will soon be a reality when the doors open in the new Cultural Centre toward the end of the Spring Session of Artspace Classes. The new environment will offer a roomy, bright atmosphere for continuing development of the preschool program and numerous courses for young people as well as adults. The three large areas of the Artspace will facilitate scheduling of various classes at the same time.

The wet crafts room is a self contained area with a tile floor for easy clean-up and suitable for sculpture, crafts and cooking classes. The sprung wood dance floor of 1300 square feet is perfect for Ballroom Dancing and other various dance classes as well as aerobics. The carpeted space is suitable for dry crafts, modelling and certified courses requiring a large area and will accommodate up to one hundred participants.

Due to the Easter Holiday weekend registration will be held from Tuesday, April 21 to Friday, April 24. The classes begin the week of April 27 in the current Artspace and will continue for eight weeks. If the building plans remain on schedule, the last few weeks of the Spring Session will be held in the new Cultural Centre.

Cultural Centre Ready

The "Big Move" into the new North Peace Cultural Centre is scheduled for May 30. Within a few weeks of the "move", the entire building will be in operation with the Public Library, Artspace, Public Art Gallery and a 413 seat theatre.

After seven years of development the residents of the North Peace are looking forward to the use of the \$4.6 million facility. Events and theatre productions have already been scheduled into the new building.

The new facility manager, Ian Forsyth, arrived from Vancouver May 1 to begin organizing the operation of the Cultural Centre.

Policies and procedures for operation will be in place soon and arts groups will be able to plan their next season in the new building.

The Building Committee has kept the construction schedule on budget and as close to "on time" as possible. The Building Committee consisting of John Herron, Harvey Ruddell, Larry Evans and Chairman Mike Waberski have worked with Howard/Yano Architects and Kalmar Construction through this past winter to complete the final construction of the Cultural Centre.

Two Employment and Immigration UIC Programs are currently

in progress to get the Cultural Centre open. Three construction workers have been on the job in the building since September helping tradesmen in a variety of ways. Three other UIC employees are working with the Opening Committee to plan the Gala Grand Opening. The Opening Committee of Brian Palmer, Teresa Ruddell, Joe Havixbeck, Ella Fraser and Trail LeClerc are planning the Gala Grand Opening for June 26/27. "Arts Edge" of the Knowledge Network will be in Fort St. John to film the Opening for television. Tickets to the Gala Opening will available soon.

To celebrate the construction of the Alaska Highway, Stage North will present the "Alcan Craze of '42" beginning July 17th. The Alcan Craze was written by local playwright, Debra Butler. The writing of the play was funded by Canada Council under the Explorations Program. The play was completed in February with some rewriting to be done after the play is cast to accommodate different character traits.

The Alcan Craze of '42 is a historical dramatization based on the experiences of people that were connected in some way to the construction of the Alaska-Canada Military Highway during the months of March to October, 1942. In a recent interview with Debra Butler she said, "Most of the characters in the play actually were involved in the Hudson's Bay Company Store during that time. I tried to make the play as authentic as possible by using real people for the characters as well as inserting actual news clippings to be read by the characters during the play," she stated.

The play will be directed by Tom Kirschner and produced by Sandy Allen. Debra will continue to be involved in the play until production time. She hopes that people who attend the show leave feeling that they have been "informed as well as entertained".

The play will run on July 17, 18, 23, 24, and 25th in the new theatre of the Cultural Centre.



"Oklahoma" Comes to Fort St. John




Hot Shoes Dance Company.




New & Exciting Artspace Classes


