Northern artists have used outstanding creative talent to make the more than 40 artworks which will be modelled at the Wearable Art Fashions Show on Friday, September 30, for the delegates of the Assembly of B.C. Arts Council Conference.

An overwhelming response to the Wearable Art Fashion Show has Peace Gallery curator April Ingham lining up models and coordinating accessories for this spectacular show. Original designs are by artists from Whitehorse, Fort St. John, Chetwynd, Dawson Creek, Pouce Coupe, Hill Top Ranch and Vancouver.

Breathtaking colours, intricate lace work, and, sometimes, amusing creativity are highlighted in works like the woven jackets, the 14th Century Scottish wedding dress, and the paper vests. Jewelry, hats and other unique pieces of artwork will give added flare and style to the creative clothing.

What the Community Arts Council really does

A fresh look at the mandate of the Fort St. John Community Arts Council in the past year has clarified the purpose of the Arts Council for many of the members. At each meeting a short session called 20 Minutes for the Future focused on the duties and responsibilities of the Arts Council. Here is a brief summary:

The Arts Council serves the community:

- ▶ by developing arts programs for community enjoyment and understanding of the arts. The Partly Arts Concert Series features more classical and unique concerts than would normally be brought into Fort St. John by popular demand. Arts North Video Series is ready for televising on Cable 10 T.V.
- by awarding excellence each year in the schools and the community in arts areas. Student awards go to Northern Lights College and North Peace Secondary School. The Music Scholarship goes to a Grade 12 graduate. The Business for the Arts Award goes to a community business supporting the arts each year
 - > by encouraging art groups to take

part in community celebrations and conferences. Floats in parades, entertainment for business conferences, lighting and sound requirements outside of the theatre are often provided for the community by Arts Council member groups.

The Arts Council serves its 29 member groups:

- ▶ by offering the opportunity for financial assistance through the granting process complete with well-defined criteria.
- ♦ by providing \$2 million liability insurance for those groups without a "home."
- by communicating with government, out of town arts organizations, and among the groups themselves.
- by promoting each arts group within the community and encouraging new members for each group.

The Fort St. John Community Arts Council welcomes individual membership as well as group members. Everyone interested in the arts may join the Arts Council.


