A silent auction of gifts donated by Arts Councils throughout the province is open to everyone in the Peace Gallery North on Sept. 30 and Oct. 1.

Delegates will be treated to riverboat rides and few lucky individuals will be riding with Bob Batchelor of Northern Mountain Helicopters to view the Peace River after all the work of the Conference is complete.

Many local businesses are planning to put special arts displays in their windows. The conference committee will connect those windows with a series of painted footsteps to guide Conference delegates and businesses to special places of interest.
