Interest Grows In Festival As Committee Finishes Plans

MORE DETAILS ON FESTIVAL MAY 20 AND 21

As the date of the Fort St. John Musical Festival approaches enquiries are being received in batches by the secretary, asking for details on a variety of questions. The committee in charge of the Festival has asked that some of these enquiries be given publicity so that as many as possible of the candidates will know what to expect when they reach St. John.

There will be no loudspeaker for use of elocution, dramatic, or vocal entrants. Hugh Mortimer, official accompanist, will be availble for practice before the Festival if those requiring his assistance will inform him ahead as to when they will be ready for a run-through. Dramatic entries are informed that they will have to provide their own grease to provide their own grease paint.

There is adequate dressingroom space for dramatic participants, but the committee would if props are needed for productions, the stage committee in Fort St. John should be immediately informed.

The Women's Institute of Fort St. John have arranged billets for entrants. The Committee asks that your group get in touch with the Festival secretary, Mrs. Janet Williamson, well in advance, instructing her as to how many billets will be required.

Entrants to the Festival will receive free tickets to all preliminary sessions. All other than prizewinners will be asked to buy tickets only for the Grand buy tickets only for the Grand Finale, the night of May 21st, when prizes and certificates will be presented. Cost of these will be fitly cents to everyone. Interested friends and spectators will be expected to pay fifty cents per day (twenty-five cents for children) for preliminary for children) for preliminary for children) for preliminary sessions.

It has been arranged with the restaurant owners of Fort St. John that rates will be secured for meals for children attending the Festival.

Musical Festival Committee Winds Up Year Reorganization Meeting Planned September 15

PROCEEDS AMOUNT TO ALMOST \$400

The Fort St. John Musical Festival Association and Dramatic Guild wound up the 1946 season at a meeting held June 5 at the home of the president, J. R. Campbell. Bills were passed for payment, and other affairs settled, and the meeting learned that almost four hundred dollars had been taken in between entries and door fees. The government's grant, not yet received, is exclusive of this sum.

An honorarium was approved

An honorarium was approved as a token of appreciation for the services of Mrs. Janet Williamson, who acted as secretary. Letters of thanks were instructed writeen to the Royal Canadian Air Force, who supplied entertainment for the children during the final Festival concert, and to others who contributed to the success of the affair.

The committee regretted that in the matter of trophies no mention was made at the time of award of engraving the legend of the award on the shields and cups. Letters will be sent to all winners, instructing them as to when and where they may send their trophies for inscription, cost of which has already been looked after by the donors.

A re-organization meeting of the Festival Committee has been tentatively set for September 15, and it is hoped that next year's effort will get under way in the fall—so that syllabuses and other details of competition will be in the hands of competitors a matler of months—instead of weeks —ahead of competition dates.
