At the January meeting of the North Peace Music Teachers' Association, it was announced that the Piano Adjudicator for the Music Festival which starts March 13th will be Mr. Arne Sahlen from Kimberley, B.C. We look forward to the festival with this dynamic young artist to help and teach us. His workshop,

following the festival, will be held at the Baptist Church on Saturday, March 19 and will be open to all interested piano performers or teachers of this area.

ARNE SAHLEN studied Pian Peformance with Dr. Robin Wood, F.R.A.M., at the University of Victoria. H graduated with Distinction in 1978. He won the City of Victoria Medallion and the B.C Provincial Senior Pian Championship that year, and represented B.C. at the Canadian National Festival. A winner o Royal Conservatory of Musi Silver Medals in 1969 and 1977, he wasa warded the Gold Medal and \$1,000.00 Helen Tough Murray Scholarship in 1979, for th highest mark in Canada on hi A.R.C.T. Performanc examination.

Arne received the A.V.C.M. Teacher's Diploma of the Victoria Conservatory of Music it 1978. A member of the V.C.M. Piano and Theory faculties from 1975 to 1980, he also opened an operated a piano studio in nearby Duncan, B.C., from 1978 to 1980 He attended the Banff School of Fine Arts, Professional Studie Program, in 1980-81.

Arne moved to Kimberley B.C., in 1981 to open a piano and theory studio. He has gived concerts, Master Classes workshops, and festival adjudications throughout B.C. a well as in Alberta and the northwestern United States. He is also Co-director of an annual Piano Summer School at the Victoria Conservatory of Music.




