FORT ST. JOHN — A Stephen King creation will come alive in Fort St. John this fall, just in time for Halloween.

Misery, a horror drama production put on by two local theatre groups, will bring "your worst nightmares into living colour" beginning Oct. 26, said a news release.

Not-Quite-a-Theatre Company and Stage North warn that the adult and violent content is not for the weak of heart, as the production explores the dark side of love and obsession.

Locals Laura Doray and Gilles Francoeur play the lead characters, last seen in local productions Steel Magnolias and Noises Off, respectively.

Director Michael Sawatzky had nothing but praise for the pair.

"Both Gilles and Laura have a real sense of the characters," Sawatzky said

The festival offers audiences a number of local productions, a theatre forum, an awards ceremo-

ny and a closing reception.

There will also be a Directors Workshop offered to potential directors of live theatre productions. John Cooper, who is the adjudicator for the festival will be the instructor for this workshop which will take place on Saturday, March 31 from 1 to 5 p.m. If you would be interested in registering for this workshop you can call Sue Popesku at 785-6214.

Stage North Theatre Society will be offering two productions during the festival and will also be showing them the week before the festival. Back by popular demand is the production "The Melville Boys" which is directed by Blair Scott. The show is about two brothers who embark on a "guys" weekend of hunting and fishing at a lakeshore cabin. Enter some women into the picture and you have a weekend of dance, card

games, bedroom games, too many beers, a few laughs and a few tears.

inside of herself and prove that she is not insane. However, the further she searches, the further she sinks into insanity. This show will be seen on Thursday March 30 at 8 p.m.

As well, local playwright Cynthia Livingstone, who brought us "Last of the Big Inch", has entered a monologue called "Archie" which looks at a forgotten WW1 veteran who is haunted by his war experiences and plagued by incontinence, stripped of autonomy and whose sole joy in life is to head to the Legion for a pitcher of draft. This is part of a play to commemorate the armed conflicts in which Canada has taken part. This show can be seen on Saturday, April 1 at 7 p.m.

At the Awards Ceremony on Saturday April 1 at 8:30 p.m., one of the Mainstage plays may be chosen to represent the Peace River Zone at Mainstage 2000 in Delta in early July. After awards are handed out, both audience members and festival participants will be invited to the Closing Reception in the loft at the

Cultural Centre.

If you would like to take part in this festival, you can buy individual evening tickets or a festival pass for all shows. The cost of the pass (for all five evenings) is \$35 for adults and \$25 for students and seniors. 25 at 8 p.m.


