The North Peace Historical Society has coordinated a five month project for downtown Fort St. John to celebrate the 40th Anniversary of the Construction of the Alaska Highway. A temporary Alaska Highway Museum displaying memoriabilia of the Alaska Highway construction era will operate from May to September 30, 1982. The museum will receive maximum exposure on the regional level and, through tourist involvement, the museum success may filter continent wide.

The temporary museum will use displays presently housed in the Peace Island Park Museum in Taylor, 12 miles away, and share student employees with that museum. Transportation of displays and students offers a unique and highly visable form of promotion for a rental agency.

For the project, the Historical Society needs a pick-up truck in working condition, the only requirement. The truck would have a large sign on both sides: The Alaska Highway Museum - Transportation courtesy of (rental agency) The truck would be in use daily along the Alaska Highway, in Taylor, and in Fort St. John constantly advertising the good will of the rental agency.

The Historical Society can offer a tax-deductible receipt for the five months rental and maximum promotion through radio, newspaper, poster and brochure credits along with the truck signs.

The project is a community effort to provide an educational activity for residents and retain tourists in the community for a short time. The space rental has been donated by Highfield Development; Employment and Immigration Canada has provided student employment; Northern Lights College will supply desks, chairs, and audio visual equipment; Canada Council has granted the cost of a transportation exhibit; the Cultural Services Branch of the Provincial Secretary, the Leon and Thea Koerner Foundation, and New Horizons are reviewing our grant applications at the present; and the Downtown Businessmen's Association will donate supplies and materials.


