

An Evening of Chekhov is a 'tour de force'

While highbrows might associate Chekhov with drawing room scenes filled with melodramatic Russians suffering from a genteel form of Weltschmerz, the theatre audience of Stage North are in for an unusually funny and farcical side of this 19th century dramatist.

Playing every Thursday, Friday and Saturday evening fron now until March 14 are three one act comedies: The Proposal, The Bear and A Jubilee.

Chekhov himself was amazed at the uproarious enthusiasm with which these were received.

Typical of his tolerant attitude concerning a flawed but loveable humanity is his remark: "I've managed to write stupid vaudeville which, owing to the fact that it is stupid, is enjoying surprising success.

It is seldom that I have seen an audience as weak from the assaults of laughter and incredulity as that which poured out of Stage North on opening night.

Flushed with success, the actors knew they had a hit when they couldn't, stop their contagious hilarity at the reception afterward.

Stanislavsky, the great advocate of method acting, observed of Chekhov that he knew how "to destroy both the inner and outer falsity of the stage presentation."

With an Ingenious perception of the possibilities, director Michael Puttonen has broken the barriers between reality and art by inviting | the Flying Cadenza Family, shortly to appear at the London Palladium, to act as hosts and stage hands.

This family of professional actors adds the warmth of the English working class pub atmosphere and the verve of the English music hall to the 'performance, tying together all three plays with absurd improvisations.

With the Cadenza Family, Puttonnen brings us into the veritable world

of stage as soon as we enter the door.

Peanuts, anyone?

The Proposal opens in the barnyard with the arrival of a painfully shy suitor, played brilliantly by Daniel Vecchio, who is convincingly Russian in looks and manner.

He is received by the father of daughters the world over, a conciliatory but temperamental old fool, as delightfully portrayed by Doug Xenis.

The strong-willed spinsterish daughter, played by Heather Archer, temporarily manages to get her priorties straight—relegating her conviction of being right to the advantage of getting a husband, any husband, even this hypochondriac suitor.

How he palpitates!

It is a quesion of ownership of land that sets off the combatants, and a question of the superiority of each one's dog that ends the battle of the sexes.

With the lovers locked in deadly combat, the father shouts happily, "There. Family happiness has begun. Bring the champagne!"

As the beautifully elegant widow, true to her dead profligate husband in The Bear, Betty Ann Xenis manages to strike the right balance between reticence and imperiousness.

'Fred Galloway, as the irate man come to collect the debt incurred by the deceased runs into a brick

Chekhovian world is the old manservant Looka, the ineffectual voice of reason.

As performed by Joe D'Attilio, he quite frankly steals the show.

An appropriate wrap up, A Jubilee, celebrates the pretensions and illogicality of the world of finance on the occasion of the 15th anniversary of the Mutual Credit Society.

Of particular note is the performance by Sheila Sapers who plays the old woman intimidating everyone from the mad bookkeeper, effectively rendered by Robbie Rapin, to the chairman of the board, amusingly delineated by Dennis Szalai.

She simply demands, since she's "weak and defenceless," the 24 roubles, 36 kopecks her sick husband was incorrectly said to have borrowed from the Mutual Aid Fund.

That this has nothing to do with the bank is quite beside the point.

Banks are for getting money from, aren't they?

Driving the poor men still further to distraction is the chairman's wife, charmingly performed by Barb Zienkiewicz, who simply won't stop talking.

Like tourists from abroad, the Cadenza Family enter the world of the play as bank shareholders to observe the consequent mayhem.

The result is a tour de force for the director, the
