



ALCAN HIGHWAY

We are stationed at Summitt Lake, The Aleutian Islands are at stake. The Alcan Highway is the supply road. To get the supplies, it's the only mode.

Over the snow and icy hills we go, To where, we don't know. They say they are going to Alaska. I don't know, could be Athabaska.

To Fort Nelson and Muncho Lake, The only trips we are allowed to make. A hundred miles north, a hundred miles south. Our only news is by word of mouth.

We are lost somewhere between. No city lights can be seen. Sun in our eyes from nine-thirty to three. Come on Northern Lights so we can see.

Digging wood from under the snow, Cold isn't it? Of course, you wouldn't know. My men and I do, we are here to reveal, Being cold at 30 below is definitely for real.

The trucks are coming, we must take them on. In a couple of hours, I'll be gone. Driving this road you must beware, You miss sliding off by the width of a hair.

Around the curves, around the bends, You wonder where the hell it ends. Come on destination, come into view. I need some coffee, my feet are cold too.

Winding in and Winding out, Fills my mind with serious doubt. If the man who built this road Was going to hell or coming out.

The Alaska Highway Road Show

is a touring celebration

marking the occasion of the 75th Anniversary of the famous Alaska Highway. Launched in July 2017, at the Provincial Archives of Alberta as part of Edmonton's Historic Festival, the tour will visit 11 communities along the highway to Whitehorse in the Yukon Territory.

The Road Show celebrates the Trail of '42 with musician Bill Dolan, author Allison Tubman and storyteller Kathy Jessup who all have long family histories with the Alaska Highway. Raised as "highway kids," they lend an authentic voice to this tribute concert.

ABOUT THE PERFORMERS

KATHY JESSUP Producer-Artistic Director and Storyteller Kathy (Dolan) was raised in Fort Nelson, BC, but resides in Edmonton where she is the Artistic Director of the TALES Storytelling Festival. She performs, nationally and internationally. telling stories in Canada, Scotland, Iceland, and Africa. During the 1950's her parents owned "Lum 'n' Abners," a stopping place at Mile 233. Kathy features tales of the dramatic challenges that faced Highway construction crews and early residents.

BILL DOLAN Musician

Bill grew up listening to tales told by his father, Frank, one of the early commercial truck drivers on the Alaska Highway. As an accomplished musician and former teacher, Bill relates Frank's memories giving the audience a glimpse of a dramatic time in Canadian history from a very *personal* point of view. His original song Trail of '42 is featured on the commemorative CD of the Alaska Highway 75th Anniversary.

ALLISON TUBMAN Author

As author of *The MacDonalds: The Lives & Legends of a Kaska Dena Family*, Allison won a silver medal at the IndieFab Awards 2014 and another at the Independent Publisher Book Awards 2015. As one of the few remaining members of her tribe, she is passionate about honouring the legacy left to her. She proudly presents personal artifacts, photographs and memories of her extended family including those of her great-grandfather, renowned Alaska Highway guide Charlie MacDonald. Allison's powerful images take us inside the lives of her ancestors - pre and post Highway- a resilient and self sufficient people, who have lived in the mountains of north eastern BC for many generations.
