The Artspace staff with the assistance of the Arts Council volunteers, have been able to serve the community by generating two thirds of the annual cost of operation and receiving assistance for rent from the City of Fort St. John.

In order to provide a wider scope of arts activities in the community, the Arts Council continuously monitors all employment programs in the area. Whenever program objectives coincide with arts needs and objectives, well-researched applications are submitted to the funding source.

In this way the Arts Council has caused a total of \$ 180,000 to flow into the community from 1986 to 1988 and has provided a total of 2,100 person/days of employment for residents of the area.

ARTSPACE SERVES COMMUNITY

The Artspace offers community information and a ticket service to the North Peace for the seventh consecutive year in 1989-90. The easy to remember telephone number 785-1989 has received hundreds of inquiries asking about schedules and activities of sports events, environmental groups, arts and much more. In the past few months a larger than usual number of new - comers have come in for information.

The artspace offers a free communication system for the entire community by keeping track of annual happennings on the up-to-date calender. When arranging special events many groups are asking first what else has been planned for specific dates. This attempts to avoid major conflicts of too many public events on the same day.

The What's Going on Calender is compiled at the Artspace every Monday morning for publication in Wednesday's Alaska Highway News. FAll groups are asked to phone 785-1989 to submit their events before 12 noon on Monday. No charge is levied for this service and the sooner the information gets on the calendar, the sooner more people can be informed.

The Artspace frequently receives inquiries from CBC Radio about who to contact concerning issues and events in the community. All non-profit groups are welcome to leave their current Board of Directors names and phone numbers. Tourism calendars and current events notices are sent to Grande Prarie, Dawson Creek, Prince George and Vancouver from the Artspace.

The Artspace is the home of the twenty-three member groups of the Arts Council and the meeting place for non-arts groups such as the Bridge Club, Blizzard Bicycle Club, Personal Computer Users and many more. The Arts Council governs the use and operation of the Artspace.

The annual budget of the Artspace is supported by the Community Arts Council with one-third representing the rent for the space supplied by the City of Fort St. John. The Arts Council fundraises to meet the major portion of the \$30,000 annual operating costs. The Provincial Employees Service Fund has assisted in the fundraising for the past three years.

The Board of Directors of the Arts Council welcomes all input into the development fo the arts activities and suggestions for community invovement. The Arts Council meets every third Monday of each month at the Artspace at 7:30 PM. You are welcome to find out more about the arts on the first meeting of the 1989-90 season on September 18, 1989.
