10 YRS AGO — MAR 19, 1969 POISON CONTROL Centre — A poison control centre was established at the Providence Hospital on the afternoon of March 17 with a visit from Dr Anthony Larson, of the provincial health department. The poison control centre, which consists of a metal filing cabinet about two feet long by a foot wide and six inches high contains cards listing over 1,500 products, their degree of toxicity, antidotes and other recommended treatments. With the control centre the hospital staff members have at their fingertips information enabling them to give advice to physicians and others for immediate treatment of poisonings. On discussing the compiling of this in-formation, Dr Larson stated there was no difficulty in procuring information on drugs but when it came to patent medicines and commercial products the manufacturers were reluctant to make known the contents of the products. For this reason the contents of the file are completely confidential to the hospital staff.

10 YRS AGO - MAY 17, 1969 WOMEN OF FORT ST JOHN are producing babies at a rate well above the national and provincial average, according to annual report of the acting director for the Peace River Health Unit. The higher birth rate reflects the young age group found in this area. While the birthrate in the health unit as a whole and including FSJ was lower than in 1967, the average per 1,000 population was 24.6 as compared to 17.6 nationally and 17 provincially. With total live births in the entire health unit at 1,035 Fort St John's 439 births makes it the most prolific centre of the unit!

Fort St John's town council held its first regular meeting of 1969 Monday evening with newly-elected Mayor Bill Stark at the head of the table.

At the meeting the town's newest alderman, KW dixon, a local doctor, was elected as Fort St John's representative on the Peace River Regional Hospial District Board. He will take over his duties as of February 1 at which time the term of ex-mayor, Ralph Pomeroy, on the regional board expires.

Also among the first business of the new year was the appointment of Mayor Stark of his committee heads.

Ald Peter Frankiw was given finance, planning, traffic, street lights and traffic lights; Ald K W Dixon will be in charge of water, sewer, building and boundary expansions as well as the regional instrict; Ald Mel Clarke is to look after public works, streets, sidevalks and drainage.

Ald Pappy Galbreath will once again take care of recreation, planning (in conjunction with Alderman Frankiw), parks, the cemetery and tourism; Ald Glen Fox will be in charge of garbage and welfare; Ald W Horst has been given the fire department, zoning, civil defence and ambulance service.

Mayor Stark has taken industrial development under his own control.

In announcing his committee appointments he suggested aldermen meet with civic employees involved with their various committees and co-operate in discussing problems.



weekend and at press time the hospital was still being fed by an emergency stand-by tank. Portions of the hospital were flooded to a depth of two feet when the main went.

Hospital uses emergency water supply

Last Sunday afternoon a water main supplying Providence Hospital in Fort St John broke after apparently freezing.

Sister Leclerc, hospital administrator, stated Monday there was no emergency shortage of water as the hospital was immediately switched over to a 22,000-gallon reserve tank. The tank was kept filled by the Fort St John Volunteer Fire Depart-

On Monday morning the break had still not been found, however, it was thought to be somewhere on the hospital grounds.

Hospital facing \$50,000 MAIRS, 1969

The Fort Nelson General Hospital is being sued by Cloverdale Construction Co Ltd for an alleged \$50,000 breach of contract.

Fort Nelson is a member of the Peace River Regional Hospital District and when the district's board met last week in Fort St John its aid was enlisted in the legal battle.

Representing the northern hospital's board of management at the meeting were

Messrs Al Bumstead and Don Gordon.

The law suit goes back to the pre-regional district days when the hospital was constructed (1964). It apparently arose after the construction company did not show an expected profit on the job. It, in turn, is claiming this was due to a failure by hospital officials to supply adequate water to the site.

The two Fort Nelson spokes-

men expressed displeasure with the way the hospital was built and at one point Mr Gordon said it is "falling apart" He claimed that among other things the hospital floors are sagging. Mr Gordon also stated that a law suit claiming poor workmanship had once been considered against the contractor.

He refuted the construction company's charges regarding the water supply.

To date the hospital and the contractor have gone through one court case and one arbitration board in an attempt to sort out their differences. Both the court and the board decided in favor of the hospital.

At last week's regional district meeting the delegation was instructed to continue the fight. The district will be supplying the necessary financial backing.

When the Peace River Regional District met Tuesday, March 25, in Dawson Creek it approved a \$58,175 operational budget.

It also went for a \$261,720 budget for the Peace River regional Hospital District. A good portion of this is made up by the first payments on a new Chetwynd Hospital.

Ald Pappy Galbreath, who represented Fort St John at the meeting, states the hospital budget will mean an approximate 1.5 mill increase to Fort St John ratepayers.

He also reported that Chetwynd is hoping to build an arena through the regional district. Only people in the area served by the arena will be taxed for it, Galbreath said, however.

The Chetwynd representation is presently doing a study to determine just what this area will be.

A recommendation, also from the Chetwynd representation, that the regional district take over ambulance service, was sent back for further study.



This yearly chance to get to know the inner workings of our hospital has been scheduled for a Sunday afternoon to enable as many as possible to make the visit. So the invitation is out to feel free to visit the hospital anytime from 2 pm to 4:30 pm on Sunday, May 11. Refreshments will be serv-

Under the smoothly working surface of the hospital are many departments and personnel not normally in contact with the public or even suspected of existing. The Providence Hospital and the Alaska Highway News hope with the pictures and article on this page to bring to you some of the little known aspects of work in the hospital as well as highlight other areas you may already know about.

PERSONNEL

Staff at the Providence Hospital has increased by 13 people in the past year. In September of 1968, Sister Dechant, director of nursing and head operating-room nurse resigned from her position and was replaced by Mrs K Pain as director of nursing and Miss Judith Barron as head nurse in the operating room.

Staff at the hospital is constantly in training to keep methods and procedures upto date. This is done through in-service training and through institutes attended by the staff. Mrs O Koetsier as in-service co-ordinator orientates new staff with necessary follow-up.

With 3,844 patients being treated in hospital in 1968 the local hospital has an average bed occupancy of 74.6 per cent.

with over 9,000 units of lab work produced. However the only staff increase has been one extra person coming in one day per week.

The final X-Ray expansion renovations were made and the first X-Rays with the new equipment were taken on July 1, 1968. The total cost of the new equipment was over \$55,000 and renovations amounted to \$17,000. Over 16,000 X-Ray films were

The efficiency of the physiotherapy department has stimulated the doctors to greater use of the department. Expansion renovations costing \$1,400 enlarged and up-dated the area. Several treatment aids were purchased and the Women's Auxiliary donated a wax bath worth \$345.

TREATMENT

In the emergency department of the hospital over 7,500 patients were treated in the last 12 months with nearly 2,500 of these treatments consisting of genuine emergencies. Plastic transfer packs for blood donors were introduced and have prov-

DISASTER NURSING

Preparing in the event of a disaster, some staff members attended a civil defence meeting on November 4, 1968. This led to a dry run of a disaster drill in which 15 students from local schools were recruited to act as casualties. A course will be given this year for preparation of simulated casualties and another dry run will probably take place this summer.




to the patients and providing a shampoo service once a week.

ed very effective. One stretcher was added to the department and the emergency entrance was paved to help upgrade the services.

In the operating room 1,149 surgical operations were performed, the majority of them of a minor nature.

Statistics from the maternity ward indicate that the birth-rate locally is down with 15 fewer babies in 1968 than in 1967. Mrs Vi Woodward, for many years head nurse of the ward resigned that position last November but remained on staff. She was replaced by Mrs E Sherret. One set of twins and one of triplets were born in 1968.

MEDICAL RECORDS

not usually known to patients is the medical records section located in the basement. There, all details, past and present of hospitalization and treatment are kept. A more comprehensive method of coding was adopted in January of 1969 and some thought is being given to micro-filming.

KEEPING GOING

A hospital is just like a big home or hotel where people must be fed, clothed, warmed and bedded down. Although these duties fall into several departments we have joined them loosely here to tell you of them. Serving meals at the hospital is a big job when one considers that over 97,000 plates passed out of the kitchen last year. The administrator reports that


although food service has improved in quality and efficiency a qualified dietician is still very difficult to come by.

Doing the laundry for all the patients of the hospital as well as doing the uniforms and lab coats is a big job for the five workers involved.

Housekeeping involves all the people necessary to keep the hospital in immaculately clean condition. An extra janitor was added this year especially for extra cleaning such as radiators, windows, vents, walls and casters. According to a report from the administrator it takes one man and one aid one month to clean all the casters on all the beds in the hospital.

The building and maintenance people are not in direct evidence but they are the fellows who keep the water hot in the taps, keep the building temperature at an even level, apply coats of paint in yearly redecoration jobs as well as keep the exterior
