The Surveyors, Dr Bradley of Vancouver and Caroline Nash, RN who are both highly qualified and experienced professionals, performed the Survey at the hospital in mid-September. Together they posed 1200 questions through the Survey which proves every corner of the hospital. To prepare for this review the hosptal and medical staff performed six weeks of concentrated review of all phases of the hosptial's operation, and this is in addition to the regular and continuing review work done by the medical staff every month.

The Survey results are especially good this year because in 1977 the revised guide and standards changed from minimal care standards to OP-TIMAL standards. The former guide meant an assurance to trustees and the public that the health care services provided were above minimum safe levels, and left a large variance in qualities between those levels accepted as accreditable and those of top quality.

mark in school studies where 50 per cent is an acceptable level, but is only half of optimal achievement. Your hosptial has made sufficient progress during the last two years to have achieved a better rating even though the standards were much stricter for this Survey.


