

## Hospital doing well financially

Fort St John General Hospital has escaped some of the financial problems which have left other provincial hospital complaining, hospital administrator Ric Wilson said today.

It is the large hospitals in the province which have the most difficulties, he said.

Staff at other BC hospitals have complained that:

- Prince George Regional Hospital had finished a \$2.5 million, 75-bed extended care addition but only 50 of the beds can be afforded

 140 jobs have been eliminated at Royal Columbian Hospital in New Wesminster - and Vancouver General Hospital faces a \$6 million deficit because of its decision to maintain full services.

But here, Wilson said while the \$3.3 million operating budget is tight, things

are not too bad.

One problem caused by the transiency of much of Fort St John's population is with staffing the hospital.

There is high staff turnover and this adds about 10 per cent to the expense of

salaries, he estimated.

Fortunately, the city's boom makes it easier to find quality staff, he said. Before the economy soared, working in Fort St John was generally treated as "a

penalty like Siberia."

Staff co-operation is high and this has contributed to a smoother-running hospital, Wilson said.

A complaint which staff in other hospitals have voiced concerns equipment. The high cost increases when using Canada's declining dollar to buy. almost all equipment is since manufactured outside the country.

Wilson said the cost is in no way related to the manufacturing cost. Because it can be bought nowhere else, the cost is what the market will bear.

Wilson said the local hospital is wellequipped, although "there are always things that are necessary."

NOT LONG WAITS

The situation with another concern.

waiting lists, is reasonable here.

"If you needed your tonsils out, the doctor would probably say, 'When do you want to come in.' In a city, he'd say, 'I'll let you know when there is a bed.' and if you were in England, that would be about two years."

Although the hospital had to close 15 of its 100 beds to lower operating costs, the availability of beds was increased by emphasizing out-patient treatment.
