Hospital board coping with cutbacks

A budget shortfall of about \$350,000 at the Fort St John Hospital, as a result of a provincial government cutback in the budget submitted for 1982-83 will almost certainly force staff layoffs and increases in the charges made for hospital services, according to information contained in a hospital board press release issued yesterday.

'The specific cutbacks are 12 full time people, six of whom are in the nursing areas and the remainder are cuts in several departments varying form administration and finance to physiotherapy,' the press release stated.

However the board claims that the quality of service will not be reduced by these budget-trimming measures.

'We want our public to know that we have not and will not sacrifice quality... The cuts to reconcile our deficit have been made in such a way that no service needs restrict quality. You may sometimes find that longer waits may happen. Convenience may be cut, but quality will not.'

An annoucement concerning staff cuts will be made Monday afternoon and the final decision on rate increases for hospital services, like admission to emergency and the use of x-ray and laboratory services, will be annouced June 1.

According to the written statement patients receiving these hospital services in 1981 paid 'only \$2 for services which actually cost up to \$40.'

'Your board is continuing to meet and discuss what flat rate charges should be collected ... The users of those services will then be free to show us how much they value the services in relation to their willingness to put cash dollars on the line.'

LAYOFFS NOT FINALIZED

According to hospital administrator, Richard Wilson, the decision in terms of layoffs "isn't all finalized yet." He hopes that a way will be found that fewer people can be laid off by having some people work reduced hours or some other plan the labourers can come up with.

"We are holding out until Monday with layoff notices. But if nothing is on my desk by Monday morning, 12 layoff notices will go out," Wilson stated this morning. 1982

He says there has been no drop in the demand for hospital services in the current economic slowdown but that the demand has at least stopped growing.

The hospital had a total budget of \$5.5 million in the 1981-82 fiscal year and had asked for \$6.9 million for 82-83 to be able expand services. However the government has only allowed them \$5,9 million, which is \$350,000 less than necessary to maintain last year's level of activity, Wilson claims.

"We have been allowed 7.6 per cent. But the actual inflation in costs is 15 to 16 per cent. We have union wage contracts to meet which have been already negotiated," Wilson explained.



Funds coming for new bed

The city hospital's fund for a birthing bed for the maternity ward is \$2,000 richer thanks to a donation from the Fort St John Kinsmen. The bed, a \$10,000 item, is designed to allow more comfortable childbirth and was first considered by the hospital after suggestions were received from women using the hospital.

As a community project, it has already involved a couple of volunteer groups. The Women's Hospital Auxiliary has refurbished a labour room to accommodate the new bed and donated \$2,000 towards the

cost.

Their task was made easier by 4M Furniture which sold them furniture at a discount.

The bed is welcomed by the medical and nursing staff at the hospital. It will enable a woman to

go into labour and give birth in the same room, in greater privacy and comfort than presently possible.
