for the Eye Clinic at the Fort St. John Hospital and Health Centre

Total Donations Required

\$90,000

The Yag Laser Will:

- Polish lens implants after cataract surgery
 Up to 40% of cataract surgery patients develop scar tissue which clouds the lens (Posterior Capsular Fibrosis).
- Prevent and cure Angleclosure Glaucoma with a laser puncture hole 1% of people of age 50 have some type of glaucoma.
 Glaucoma is very common in First Nations people.
- Scar tissue can be removed between the cornea, iris and lens
 The laser acts like a scissor to dissect scar tissue in the interior of
 the eye. (Lysis of Fibrotic bands)

UBC EYE CLINIC

at the Fort St. John Hospital and Health Centre

Six clinics are provided in Fort St. John each year for medical and surgical treatment by both resident and staff doctors from the University of British Columbia, Vancouver, BC. Eye surgery including cataract extraction with lens implants, glaucoma procedures, corneal transplants, ophthalmic plastic surgery, plus other procedures are performed. Those requiring further investigation and/or treatment are referred to larger centres. Laser therapy is also available for certain eye conditions.

This service in ophthalmology, medical and surgical treatment of disease of the eye and related structure, was initiated in Fort St. John to fulfill two needs: 1. a lack of consultative and surgical service in the Peace Liard Region and 2. a need on the part of the UBC Department of Ophthalmology to find a place where their senior residents would gain clinical and surgical experience.

The clinic is an ideal model for telemedicine, which allows for quick transfer of tests and information between rural and large centres in order to facilitate diagnosis and treatment. Although not a full reality yet, it is anticipated that a complete program will be developed in the near future.

Take the opportunity to help provide a CT Scanner for the Fort St. John Hospital and Health Centre



What is it?

A CT Scanner (Computed Tomography) is an essential and standard diagnostic tool used extensively by physicians to provide services to their patients. The CT Scanner is a special kind of X-ray machine that, instead of sending out a single X-ray through your body as with ordinary X-rays, sends several beams simultaneously from different angles. It can be purchased as a 16 slice, 32 slice, 64 slice, or 128 slice (not suitable for our needs). Fort St. John will be purchasing a 64 slice that, along with Dawson Creek's Scanner, will provide complete and uninterrupted coverage for the BC Peace Country.

A CT Scan is a non-invasive or minimally invasive, painless medical test that helps physicians diagnose and treat medical conditions. With the use of a CT Scanner physicians can assess acute trauma, injuries, abdominal and chest disease, cardiovascular disease and stroke damage, as well as diagnose tumors, infectious diseases and musculoskeletal disorders. With the CT Scanner the physicians can guide biopsies and other minimally invasive procedures, plan surgery, and provide imaging for Oncology patients. The CT Scanner is a widely used and fundamentally basic diagnostic tool that is needed at the Fort St. John Hospital and Health Centre.



What is it used for?

- A CT Scanner is used to help doctors diagnosis and treat injuries to any part of the body. It is commonly used after a severe trauma to determine head injuries and internal bleeding, and can quickly highlight injuries to the liver, spleen, kidneys or other internal organs
- A CT Scanner is a basic tool in the diagnosis of cancer. It is particularly good at helping to diagnosis lung, liver, and pancreatic cancer since the image allows a doctor to confirm the presence of a tumor and measure its size, precise location and the extent of its spread.
- ☐ A CT Scanner is useful to investigate acute abdominal pain. Renal/ urinary stones, appendicitis, pancreatitis, diverticulitis, abdominal aortic aneurysm, and bowel obstruction are conditions that are readily diagnosed and assessed with CT.
- □ Patients with stroke-like symptoms have a window of 3 hours from the onset of the symptoms to the time permanent damage occurs. A CT Scan is the only way to determine what type of stroke the patient is having so that appropriate action can be taken.
- ☐ A CT Scan plays a significant role in the detection, diagnosis and treatment of vascular diseases that can lead to stroke, kidney failure, or even death.
- ☐ A CT Scanner can measure bone mineral density for the detection of osteoporosis.
- A CT Scanner is essential in the fight against heart disease as it is used to visualize the heart anatomy, coronary circulation, and great vessels which includes the aorta, pulmonary veins, and arteries.

Did You Know That...

- □ ...because of the Beatles' success, Sir Godfrey Hounsfield, the scanner's inventor, was able to devote about four years developing the scanner from its 1968 prototype, to something that could be used in a clinic setting. The research facility was owned by the EMI Group that, having sold 200 million of the Beatles hit records, was able to fund Hounsfield to do his research.
- ☐ ...CT Scanners have been used for over 35 years and is the standard of care we should have in our region.
- ☐ ... Fort St. John Hospital has the second busiest ER in the province, treating about 44,000 emergency patients each year.
- ... doctors in Fort St. John made over 2000 referrals to the CT Scanner in Dawson Creek last year which operates a 4 slice Scanner; and, an additional 300 people were transferred to Dawson Creek for emergency CT Scans.
- ...we have a projected 8.8% population growth for our region. A CT Scanner is necessary if we are to recruit and retain doctors and medical technicians to our area.
- ☐ ...Dawson Creek is 78 KM away which isn't far unless you or someone you love is in a life and death struggle.
