Introduction of Board Members

Guest Speaker: Lisa MacLean. Lisa was hired as the new curator for Peace Gallery North and has been making connections with community. One or two artists each week have participated in the Artist in Residence program at the gallery. Visitors have enjoyed meeting the artists and watching the creative process. The gallery is looking to connect artists in multiple disciplines. There is a book launch with Ronnie Robersts on September 22. Ronnie Roberts and Pat Ferris on October 20. Evening will feature musical entertainment. Exhibits have ben booked into 2019. Lisa will bring in outside exhibits as well as showing local artists. The artisan market will be held in December.

ArtsPost Report: Submitted by Sue Popesku. The ArtsPost continues to be full to, and beyond, capacity. The Potters and Spinners & Weavers have outgrown their spaces and the demand for the multi-purpose room is growing.

NEW BUSINESS

New Society Act: Working to have Constitution and by-law revisions ready to present at the October meeting.

Issue for discussion: Support for reinstating Art Courses at NLC. Have had recent discussions with new management of college and there is a possibility of having the program reinstated if we can demonstrate a demand within the community.

Can it be a duel credit program with the high school? This would gain the support of the school board.

There was a problem with dropping enrollment possibly caused by a lack of promotion of the program on all sides.

Northern Dance Theatre Society: Sixty-one troupe dancers completed a two week summer school with visiting instructors Regular classes started September 5. The Studio 2 Stage Christmas recital is Dec.17. The NDTS Gala is planned for May 10 and the spring recital is May 12, 2018

Scrapbooking Group: Meets Friday mornings at the ArtsPost and is looking for new members.

Fort St. John Film Society: First showing of the season is *Churchill*. Two reps from the Film Society attended TIFF, networking and sharing with other societies. There is a great line up of films for the fall.

North Peace Potters Guild: Guild had a very busy year. Many extra classes. Loss of Heather left a big void that needs to be filled. Beginner classes are full for this fall. Extension class and children's class are also full. There are now 32 guild members.

North Peace Spinners & Weavers: Had less general meetings through the year and held workshops every month instead. Membership is up to 18. Held a successful dying retreat in July and did sheep to shawl demonstrations at the fall fair. The guild held a 40th anniversary celebration on September 4 at the ArtsPost.

Mary's Wedding will be in the spring and the Peace River Zone Theatre Festival will be in May.

Peace River North Festival Association: Organization has started for 2018 festival which will be held April 4-27, 2018.

Fort St. John Country Quilters: 34,000 quilt block submitted for the Canada 150 project from across the country and from all over the world. 1700 quilts donated to Ronald MacDonald Houses with more to come. Local guild donated 137 blocks. Sew it Yourself collect almost 600 blocks from community at large.

Spectrum Arts Studios: Holding art classes at the ArtsPost. Weekly classes run September to June. Partnered with pottery instructor to do art camps in the summer; 15 children participated. Hoping to do program again next summer. Enrollments are up this year and pro-D day classes are already full.

President's Report

Reporting Period July 1, 2016 to June 30, 2017

Let's celebrate! 2017 is a "banner" year for the Arts with the 50th Anniversary of the Arts Council, 40th Anniversary of Stage North Theater Society and the 25th Anniversary of the North Peace Cultural Centre along with the 75th Anniversary of the Building of the Alaska Highway.

It's Canada's 150th Birthday and the Community Arts Council (CAC) has been celebrating the many exciting community events with our member groups. Here at the Artspost, celebrating 10 years of operation, we planted 50 of Canada's 150th Celebration tulips, painted the flower pots red and white with a maple leaf theme and positioned Canada Day painted flower pots at the airport to welcome home returning artist and visitors.

Invitations were sent out to welcome back as many people as possible, who had been involved with the local arts in our community over the past 50 years, to celebrate with us during the North Peace Cultural Centres Bright Nights in June.

Bright coloured street banners were designed by Allen White depicting Alaska Highway images from 1942. The Arts Council funded through our Advocacy Program and produced 92 banners to adorn 100th Street and had the previous Festival banners placed along 100th Avenue. The annual Art Walk through the summer months provided an interest for visitors and great exposure for artists and venues. The acclaimed "Best Pies in the World "sold out at the Fall Fair and our Christmas 'Reduce, Reuse, Recycle' sale was a success. As an affiliate member of the Peace Liard Regional Arts Council's (PLRAC), our members participated in the "Trencher" art project now on public display in Dawson Creek.

During the year Revenue Canada conducted an Audit which has impacted the way the grants to our member groups are managed and required several meetings with City Council for their support. In October the Directors held a public Round Table on the Arts and the importance of growing the arts through the display of Public Art. Directors also attended the City wide discussions on revisiting the Revitalization Plans, made grant presentations before City Council on behalf of our member groups, continued to manage the Scholarship and Bursary program providing awards to students excelling in Visual, Musical and Theater Arts at the High School level.

In addition, the Arts Council has involved our Member Groups in monthly meetings featuring guest speakers, advertized special arts events under "Take Part in the Arts" in the local

newspaper and on the CAC Website. With the support of our Member Groups we have maintained an Art Display Case at the Airport promoting a variety of art forms. For our 50th year, we are especially pleased to have rebranded the Community Arts Council logo and to have developed a brand new logo for the Artspost, soon to be launched. Four Directors attended the BC Arts Conference in Tofino and reported back on the Arts scene and events around the province. To date the Board members continue to work on revising the Constitution and Bylaws required by the Societies Act.

The Community Arts Council (CAC) Mission is dedicated to developing Arts and Culture activities and events in our community and to supporting individual artists in their creative endeavours to become self-sustaining.

For the past 10 years the Fort St. John Community Arts Council has worked diligently to develop the Artspost as a community creative centre providing studios for pottery, spinning and weaving and painting. The Artspost has remained very active, hosting children from the Library, the School District and the Kids Summer Art Camps. In addition to office and meeting rooms, it provides a permanent working space for the North Peace Potters' Guild, the North Peace Spinners & Weavers and Spectrum Art Studios offering classes to all age groups.

The CAC remains committed to serving our membership, to maintaining our community affiliations and programs and to supporting the art initiatives at the Artspost located at 10320 – 94th Avenue.

In closing, I would like to thank the Board, Member Groups, and the City of Fort St. John for their continued support and dedication to the promotion of the arts in our community and look forward to someday having a permanent Community Creative Arts Centre in Fort St. John.

Artspost 2017 Annual Report

For Fort St. John Community Arts Council AGM September 20, 2017

The Artspost has successfully completed its tenth year of operation at 10230 94 Avenue. Operated by the Arts Council, the Artspost is a community space for arts studios for classes for adults and children. The building is leased from Dean and Margaret May. The City of Fort St. John has supplied a tax exemption each year and the rest of the required funds have some from user groups, fundraising projects and the Arts Council. The cost of operations each year is \$50,000.

Financials

The Arts Council was able to successfully finance the operations thanks to the support of dedicated donors and volunteers. *PLEASE SEE ATTACHED 3 Year Projection*

Events that help to Support the Artspost operations:

- The Fall Fair World's Best Pies Sale in August has brought in over \$3000 this year. Thanks Margaret, Connie S and Connie D and Rosemary plus all the volunteers and pie makers.
- The Christmas Recycled Decorations Sale in November adds to the sources of funds for the Artspost.
- The Multi-purpose room has been rented by various groups and meetings.
- The Spinners and Weavers, Potters and Spectrum Studio pay as much rent as they can.

Tax Exemption: The City of Fort St. John has supplied the taxes each year through taxexemption. The City will now alter the delivery of the taxes and grant the tax funds to the Arts Council to pay those taxes to the landlord in the future.

Improvements:

The main bay door has been replaced due to a vehicle mishap a couple of years ago and the cold is sealed out better than before. The bay door in the back requires insulation.

The landlord continues to maintain the building. The gas lines have been examined and some electrical work has been done.

The flower pots and the flower garden continue to blossom under the knowledgeable and hard work of Rosemary Landry.

The Spinners and Weavers maintain the front room (lobby) of the building as their workspace.

Space Crunch: "THE ARTSPOST HAS BECOME TOO SMALL"

 The Spinners and Weavers are growing at a rapid pace. The small lobby area is cramped and crowded with the added loams and other equipment they require to function with their increasing number of members and activities. The Artspost has no other room for them to expand. **No solution is available at this time.**

- The activities and responsibilities of the Arts Council has revealed that the multi-use space in the Artspost is also too small. Various projects of the Arts Council no longer have work space in the multi-purpose room due to the demand from classes and meetings. The painting classes have increased and the numbers of registrants has risen. The Scrapbooking Club has regular weekly hours. The Spinners and Weavers require the space for workshops and meetings. Various Arts Council groups are booking the space for meetings. Evening meetings are often overlapping. No solution is available at this time.
- The Potters Guild has increased the number of adult and children classes requiring more
 working space, wheel space and working space which is not available to them in the
 space they currently occupy. Membership in the guild has increased putting more
 demand on the existing kilns they have. A much needed- gas kiln is still in the dreams of
 the guild. No solution is available at this time.
- The Artspost has a C-Can and a shed for storage which are both filled to capacity. The
 Potters have a C-Can as well for their storage. There is no more space for more storage
 in the yard.

Board Members Responsible for the Artspost:

The current situation where specific board members of the Arts Council are responsible for the Artspost has been a good working model for ten years. Rosemary Landry, Margaret May and Sue Popesku work together as the "responsible board members" and keep the doors open from 10am to 1pm Mon through Thurs. Sue and Rosemary have received and acted on issues concerning the Artspost, assured the financial viability of the Artspost, and recommended actions to the Board by reporting to the Arts Council. Margaret May, along with Arts Council Treasurer Connie Desfosses, have prepared budgets and financial information. Everyone is a volunteer and plays a vital role in the health and welfare of the Artspost and the Arts Council.
