Peace region arts councils receive provincial funding

There were a few less starving artists in B.C. after an announcement that over 260 grants had been awarded to artists and organizations, ranging from diverse creative disciplines throughout the province.

The Province awarded local arts and culture councils in the Peace

River area almost \$55,000.

The Fort St. John Community Arts Council received \$16, 275, the Chetwynd Community Arts Council Society got \$7,177, the South Peace Community Arts Council received \$10, 770 and the Peace-Liard Regional Arts Council was given \$20, 500.

Director of the Fort St. John Community Arts Council, Sue Popesku said arts councils throughout the province receive the basic assistance grant every year after sending a detailed application.

The money received by the various councils is based on the number of people in the communities, as well as how far the communities are from

Victoria.

"Up until now we've received about \$12-13,000 but because there's been more money put into community arts in the entire province, our amount has gone up to \$16,000 this year," said Popesku.

The grants come from the BC Arts Council's annual funding budget. The council aimed an additional \$7 million towards arts and culture groups throughout the province.

Popesku said their council was pleased, not just because of the increase in funding, but because the arts are being better recognized.

"What we're delighted in is more that the provincial government is looking to community arts and the community arts councils. They see are a very viable function within the whole province, within the arts and culture and heritage scene," she said.

The council works on a budget of

approximately \$150,000 a year, and most of the money goes towards its one full-time employee, and the running of the Arts Post.

Chairwoman of the Fort St. John Community Arts Council, Lisa Bush said the funding will help with the day-to-day operations, and it will go a long way.

"It means that we can continue for another year, pretty much," she said.

Peace River South MLA Blair Lekstrom made the announcement last week and said he felt the most important issue concerning arts and culture in the province is the contribution the councils make in their communities.

"What we like to do is make sure that we can ensure that our arts and culture community in the different societies around the province remain vibrant and able to contribute to their communities and to the young artist and older artists, to make sure that we continue to enjoy what they provide for us, which is an incredible experience," said Lekstrom.

He continued, saying sometimes it was easy to over-look the importance of arts and culture in a community.

"I get to see the important work that they do, the contribution they make to our communities and really to a thriving province, so it's very important that we invest where possible in a way that we can support our artists and up and coming arts and culture people that are working so hard to not just make their lives better but the lives of others around them," he said.

In total, 39 organizations across B.C.'s northern region will welcome new computer equipment. "In the current economic climate, it's critical that everyone reaches out and offers a helping hand,

especially to those organizations providing emotional, physical, educational, and financial support in their

communities," said Michelle Gaites, director of Telus Technology Operations in Prince George. "These computers will be used for emergency service support, learning development, educational research, and so much more. I'm so proud to be a part of Telus' goal to give where we live by supporting local communities."

The United Way generously stepped up to coordinate this initiative, and distribute the computers to those organizations needing new equipment. The Fort St. John Community Arts Councils found that several of its member groups were in need of new computers. Among those organizations taking advantage of Telus' offer are the Northeast Aboriginal Artworks Society, Fort St. John Literacy Society, North Peace

Cultural Centre, and Stage North.

Jean McFadden, Executive Director for the Fort St. John Literacy Society says they plan to use the computer as a teaching aid. She explains, "[the computer] will allow our tutors and learners to access online courses and to run our English as a Second Language software-based instructional programs. It is much appreciated!"

Art on the move

The Art That Moves You project is back on the move again! This year's artists have been selected and are

busy painting their panels in the 2009 theme: Branching Out. Fort St. John is the proud recipient of this year's Forest Capital of BC Award and what better way than to celebrate than by expressing it through art?

Each year, the Fort St. John Community Arts Council partners with the City of Fort St. John and BC Transit to deliver this exciting program. Eight panels in total are paint-

ed by local artists, which are then placed on public transit buses during the summer months. Come spring, the Arts Council creates bookmarks from the previous year's panels.

These bookmarks are released during Arts and Culture Week in April each year at the Fort St. John Public

Library. They are free to the public and are available while supplies last.

This year's theme, Branching Out, conjures up images of nature and celebrates green initiatives. In fact, this year, the Assembly of BC Arts Councils awarded supplemental funding to those arts councils whose projects included a "green" component in order to support

environmental awareness. The Fort St. John Community Arts Council, in order to meet this challenge, now reuses old advertising panels donated by Peace Country Transit. The advertising panels are given a second life and serve as a canvas for the Art That Moves You project. Rather that purchasing new material to paint on, the advertising panels, which would otherwise be thrown away, are recycled into art.

This project celebrates the tremendous talent of our local artists while displaying art in a unique way. Artist Wendy Wheat, who has now participated in this program two years in a row, believes the program is a fantastic way to get involved in the community and do something creative.

Each year eight artists are selected for the program. Artists may submit photos of their artwork and a brief description of why they would like to be considered for the program. Submissions may be made at any time throughout the year, though artist selection for the Art That Moves You program takes place in February. Wheat maintains the real reason she

wanted to participate again this year was because she has always wanted to do a painting of a Cedar Wax Wing, a bird native to the Peace Region.

"I was really happy to hear the theme was Branching Out. It gave me an opportunity to paint my favorite bird. They're quite frequent visitors at my house, but not many people get a chance to see them close up," said Wheat

Parthenon sculptures to stay in Britain

ATHENS, Greece — Greece's culture minister said Monday he was not planning to go to court to get back the Parthenon sculptures from Britain.

Antonis Samaras said the new Acropolis Museum that opened this month will boost Greece's bid for the works, which British diplomat Lord Elgin took from the site 200 years

Samaras said he will "make the greatest effort possible" to repatriate the 2,500-year-old sculptures but ruled out any kind of lawsuit.

"At this moment I have nothing of

the sort in mind," he said. Originally part of the ancient Parthenon temple, the marbles are in

the British Museum, which says it legally owns them and will not give them back.

Greece counters that the sculptures were looted from a work of art so important that its fragments should all be shown together in the new Athens museum.
