ArtsPost on the move

Volunteers renovating new building where potters will finally have a home

Over 300 volunteer hours have so far gone into renovations at the ArtsPost Too location, and it's going to take at least that much more to be ready for a grand opening by the end

of September.

The city's arts community has come together to clean, paint and refurbish cabinets and shelves at the Fort St. John Arts Council's new location on 94 Ave., which is also going to be home to the North Peace Potters Guild and the Spinners and Weavers.

The work started in June on weekends, but come August it was stepped up to daily in order to meet the tentative opening date, said arts council

director Sue Popesku.


"We still need people to help move items down here. We still need to construct a wall and we still need a carpenter, plumber and electricity," she said during a tour of the building on Tuesday.

The council has been allowed to remain in the current ArtsPost location, now referred to as ArtsPost One, until the developers decide when to demolish it. The building was sold in March to make room for a \$70-million mixed commercial and residential project with two 10-storey towers, leaving the Arts Council with the arduous task of finding a new space to rent.

The new building, located at 10320 94 Ave., was once a sign shop owned by artist and sculptor Peter Vogelaar.

Rosemary Landry, treasurer of the North Peace Potters Guild, was busy on Tuesday with family members moving equipment around in the new space, which is the guild's first home in over a decade since they were forced to leave the Northern Lights College.

"The pottery studio has been in limbo for 15 years and we've just been stored all over the place. This is wonderful - we've been working like crazy the last few months just to get

this done," she said.

Hopes are that pottery classes, which were popular last year at ArtsPost One, will start in September, and accommodate up to 12 students at a time.


