

For an exciting 6 days the BC Festival of the Arts is proud to be in Fort St. John, B.C. – the Energetic City! The BCFA is Canada's largest multi-discipline event for emerging artists and a showcase for British Columbia's up and coming talent in theatre, visual art, the performing arts, Indigenous arts, media arts, song writing, literary arts and for the first time, storytelling.

Hosted by a different B.C. community each year, nearly 800 emerging artist-delegates are chosen through Calls-For-Entry or through competition in regional events held throughout the Province. Each year approximately 60,000 artists are involved at the regional level.

The BC Festival of the Arts offers audiences a rare and exciting chance to

catch the stars of tomorrow today. Events for delegates number in the hundreds and there are dozens of public events to suit every taste. Check the daily listings for visual art, music, film and video screenings, Indigenous arts, theatre, literary readings, performing arts concerts and the Community Stage featuring the best in local talent.

Admission to events range from free to \$12 so the whole family can afford to come. Call the Festival office for information at 785-1400 or drop in at 10120-100th St. in Fort St. John.



Songwriters Workshop

The Art of Song

The Songwriters Workshop is an intense creative experience for 15 emerging songwriters selected from across British Columbia.

With guidance from two of Canada's most accomplished songsmiths, international recording artist Mae Moore, and three-time East Coast Music Award winner Ron Hynes, delegates will explore the challenges of songwriting and attend group sessions designed to enhance and expand their word crafting skills. Song construction, topic selection, lyrics and perspective, melodic structure, and contemporary acoustic music performance are just a few of the subjects that will be covered. Jam sessions are scheduled and collaboration among delegates is encouraged.

Delegates to the Songwriters program actively apply the knowledge gained in workshops and create an original piece during the Festival. Facilitators Moore and Hynes are available to assist each delegate with their work-inprogress and offer critiques and suggestions in one-onone sessions. For many delegates, this is the highlight of the program but to top off four days of hard work, delegates will perform both new and past work at the Songwriters Showcase at the North Peace Cultural Centre Theatre, Sunday, June 3 at 7:30 pm.

Visual Art

Stretching the Canvas and Pushing the Envelope - Conference

artWORK Exhibition

The artWORK exhibition is a series of showcases of over 250 works of art created by emerging British Columbia artists, reflecting many art practices. This year's artWORK venues, including the gallery at the Fort St. John Kid's Arena, feature a group show as well as 5 solo exhibitions and the Visual Art Mentors Exhibition. The variety of the art work on display at the exhibition reflects the diversity tremendous of approaches, media, and artistic disciplines of British Columbia's emerging artists.

Art work chosen for the exhibition was selected through a province wide Call for Entry as well as from regional events. The jurors: Ellen Corea, Kinichi Shigeno and Wedlidi Speck reviewed hundreds of slides and videos of works of art submitted to the Festival by visual artists from all corners of British Columbia. They also traveled throughout the province and, working with a local juror, selected art works that were on display at Regional Arts Council exhibitions.

Although the artWORK exhibition is the showcase of the visual art program, for the visual artists attending the Festival, the visual art conference, Stretching the Canvas and Pushing Envelope, is the main focus of their participation. The conference features a wide variety of unique professional development opportunities of interest to both established and emerging visual artists. Delegates will spend considerable time in workshops with these mentors, and will also receive a one-on-one critique. A series of public readings will feature full-length reading by the mentors, and flash, five-minute performances by all delegates.

Writing is a solitary practice: otherwords 2001 will give a group of exciting new authors the chance to be immersed in a community of like-minded folks for a few days. This experience will lay the foundation for a peer network, a source of inspiration and support far into the future. Northern Dawn

The Indigenous Arts Service Organization is in its 6th year of partnership with the BC Festival of the Arts. The IASO program embraces artists from First Nations, Inuit and Metis cultures and features up to sixty emerging artists working intensively with their professional counterparts in the disciplines of visual arts, literary arts, and multi-media and performance. Indigenous Arts 2001 delegates have earned their place through regional events which include the Southern Interior Festival in Chase as well as two Northern Festivals in Chetwynd and Moberley Lake.

At the BC Festival of the Arts they take part in workshops and mentoring sessions in one of the four disciplines, combining both traditional and contemporary art practice. This year's theme Northern Dawn uses metaphor of the early dawn as the most powerful part of the day for aboriginal youth. Traditionally aboriginal youth teachings were to wake up at dawn and give thanks in preparation for the gift of a new day. The delegates will follow the theme to develop their works at the regional festivals through mentorship, performances and exhibi-

Delegates will use the theme to stimulate and renew public and aboriginal appreciation of the unique, diverse traditional arts disciplines of BC Nations. Creating guidance and exploring new interpretative mediums, our acclaimed mentors include author AnneHarte, multi-media producer Annie Frazier Henry, internationally recognized performance artist Gary Oker and visual artist Billy Cohen.

Lastly, lines form the basis for learning about theatre in our high school drama program LearningLines, a program where committed and talented young people have the opportunity to learn new performance skills and to bring their work to a new level.

LaughLines is pleased to welcome four of Canada's finest theatre artists to share their talent, knowledge and enthusiasm with our delegates at this year's BC Festival of the Arts. Yuk Yuk's founder Mark Breslin leads our Stand-Up Comedy workshop, an amazing opportunity for emerging comedians to hone their craft and learn about the comedy business. We welcome the participation of the ICA Multicultural Youth Group and their play Telling It Like It Is: Voices From Around Your World.
