Peace performers at B.C. Pavilion

VANCOUVER — The British Columbia Pavilion at Expo presents 'Frontiers of Peace', a showcase of entertainment from the big-sky country of Peace River/Alaska Highway from August 17 through 23.

The showcase is a week-long festival of dance, music and comedy from the communities of Dawson Creek, Fort Nelson, Fort St. John and Tumbler Ridge.

Highlights include the Northern Dance Theatre Society, a group of five-to-18 olds who perform their tap and jazz routines in elaborate costumes, and the Coal Vaulters Gymnastic group from the mining town of Tumbler Ridgte. Other performers include the Alaska Highway Road Show, two Fort Nelson aldermen who perform an audience participation comedy routine; native singer/songwriter Jimmy Jack; the Rendevous Stage Players; plus the Can-Can Girls and Can-Cannettes.

The 'Frontiers of Peace' theme is intended to depict the region as a recreational frontier; an area with superb canceing, wilderness-walking

and hunting. Located in the northeastern part of the province about 1,100 kilometres from Vancouver, Peace River is bordered by the prairies to the east, the Yukon to the north and the Rocky Mountains to the west.

Performances occur throughout the day from 10:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. on the Plaza of Nations, the Bandshell outside the Discovery B.C. Pavillion and on the Centre and Discovery Stages inside the pavilion.


A special showcase previewing the week's events will be staged at the Plaza of Nations on Sunday, August 17 from 6:15 to 10:00 p.m.

The Peace River/Alaska Highway region is the last of nine B.C. regions to be showcased during the B.C. Pavilion's Regional Showcase program. At the end of the 10 week program, more than 8,000 performers from Greater Vancouver, Fraser Valley, Cariboo/Chilcotin, Vancouver Island, Kootenay/Boundary, Okanagan/Similkammen, High Country, Rocky Mountain and North by Northwest regions will have performed for the world at Expo '86.

south shore of the site, and B.C. Place stadium can be seen in centre of picture.





Display to be changed

Plans are being made to change the Region H display at the British Columbia Pavilion at Expo.

After meeting with the Ministry of Tourism last week, David Podmore, the official responsible for the displays told Norma Cox of the Peace River Alaska Highway Tourist Association that changes would be made, with possibly another character being added to the counter scene from Mae's Kitchen.

"He didn't say what the character would be but he did say somthing would be added," she said.

Concerns were expressed about the lone figure being served in the diner. Because the region has often been

referred to as a melting pot of different backgrounds some felt that it didn't seem fair that only one would be represented.

A second concern was that even with the paper-mache moose head, the imitation cabin front and the counter scene, the display wasn't successful in portraying an area well-known for its hunting, fishing, scenery and other recreational facilities."

But on second thought Cox doesn't think it was "that bad."

"Everyone who went down to the B.C. opening was from the Tourist Association so they were looking at

One of Ms. Farris Darling's major coups has been signing Leningrad's

Kirov Ballet. Alma Mater for such ballet superstars as Balachine, Nureyev and Baryshnikov, the Kirov is making its first North American appearance in more than two decades. Its six-performance visit, May 14-19 at the Queen Elizabeth Theatre, promises to be a gala event.

The contemporary dance scene is well represented by five Canadian companies performing new and specially-commissioned works, August 12-14.

"Government support of the Canadian attractions is terrific," notes Ms. Farris Darling.

A total of \$1.5 million in federal support is assisting 12 groups to create or enhance existing works of the Festival. Funding from the Department of Communicationsl also makes it possible for Canadian artists and ensembles tour national centres before or after their Festival engagements.

Performances at the Festival are presented in both on and off-site venues. Tickets are on sale at Eaton's Travel Centres or ad-

Inside Expo reaches outside markets

THANKS TO SOME HIGH-FLYING high tech, information about Expo 86 is reaching more than 400 radio stations and cable systems in Canada and the United States.

'INSIDE EXPO', a series of 60-second updates produced by CKNW radio in New Westminster, on the planning, personalities, and participants of Expo 86, uses the Anik-D satellite to reach radio stations around B.C. And with the help of CKNW's sister station, CFMI-FM, the program is linked via satellite to cable systems stretching from the Arctic to the Gulf of Mexico and from the Hawaiian Islands to Bermuda.

The first 'INSIDE EXPO' feature was aired on May 3, 1985, and by the time the broadcast schedule is completed in October, 1986, more than 3,100 separate programs will

have been broadcast on any single station along with the Western Information Network owned by CKNW.

Hosted by radio and television personality Carole Taylor, the series is broadcast three times each day, seven days a week. And when March, 1986, rolls around, the schedule will increase to five programs every day.

Meanwhile, two of Canada's bestknown broadcast personalities are hosting a syndicated radio series on over 80 commercial stations across Canada.

Expo 86 Update with Fred Davis and Expo 86 Report with Red Robinson are running five days a week until Oct. 4. The programs are sponsored by the Royal Bank and B.C.'s Ministry of Tourism and conclude each time with an invitation to visitors to see other attractions taking place throughout the province.

The independent stations carrying the series receive a supply of three-day Expo tickets from the Royal Bank to be used in promotions and contests among listeners.
