FORT ST. JOHN – Five dancers from the Watt School of Irish Dance are training hard for the World Championships in Belfast Ireland, March 23-30.

The five advanced dancers qualified for this prestigious event at the Western Canadian World Qualifying which was held in Edmonton in November.

Sarah Elson, Hailey McGuire, Stevie Mazur, Morgan Gee and Patricia Robertson will join about 4,000 dancers from around the world - all hoping to make their mark at this major event.

The girls have had a successful year at the North America Championships held in Ottawa with Mazur making it to the podium placing fifth in her age group.

Gee and Robertson placed in the top 20. Joining the advanced dancers at a regional com-

petition in Edmonton recently were intermediate dancers Sarah Kantz, Megan Hansen, Robyn Bickford and Jessie Bickford, who returned home with many medals.

A larger group of dancers hope to attend the April competition in Sherwood Park, AB. They will be joined by some of the beginner dancers from the school taking to the stage for the first time.

The Watt School of Irish Dance has seen its dancers do well on the North America and world stage. Some have gone on to perform with major dance shows like Lord of the Dance and the US show, Celtic Fusion.

Twenty years later the teacher says it's good to see the young dancers of today have the same goals and expectations.






5th annual St. Patrick's Day Ceile











The 5th Annual St. Patrick's Day Ceile (pronounced kay-lee), held at the Taylor Community Hall last Saturday, was a night filled with food, music and dancing. The evening was hosted by The Slainte Society of Irish Dance and they were accompanied by dancers, starting at age 3, from the Pomeroy Academy of Irish Dance. The event has always sold out but this year was the fastest ever. Three hundred people turned out this year to watch the dances that the students have been working on all season.
