Dancers to worlds

FORT ST. JOHN - Four dancers from the Watt School of Irish Dance are busy training for their coming journey to Glasgow, Scotland where they'll compete at the World Irish

Dance Championships.

Five dancers earned their way to Scotland by qualifying at the Western Canadian Irish Dance Championships in Kelowna, which attracted more than 900 competitors from Manitoba to BC. Attending the qualifying event were: Morgan Gee, first in girls under 13; Hailey McGuire, second in girls under 15; Sarah Elson, second in girls under 17; and Jennifer Potter, third in girls under 19. Potter will not be able to make the trip to Glasgow. Stevie Mazur also took home a first place in girls under 14, obtaining a perfect score of 900 points by being first on the card of all nine judges.

Patricia Robertson was unable to compete in girls under 13 this year due to a foot injury. But she and the others will compete at the North American Irish Dance Championships - Contributed in Ottawa later this year.
