This time around it was the dancing community that had their kids sweating to a beat. Thanks in part to a Legacies 2010 grant, the Northern Dance Theatre Society secured five instructors who travelled from as far away as Texas to teach different dance techniques from hip-hop to musical theatre.

"My little guys train from two to three hours a day and my older kids could train up to seven hours a day," said Studio 2 Stage owner and NDTS artistic director Shauna Milne. "They're like, 'from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m.? Are you crazy?' But they love it and just soak it up. A lot of kids don't get out of town to experience different teachers. One of the things the society wanted to do was bring up bigger teachers, people the kids wouldn't normally get taught by.

"We got bigger-name teachers this year so our costs went up a little bit. The grant allowed us to expand a little bit more and allowed us to get instructors from far away like Texas and Las Vegas," added the dance studio

owner.

Week one of the camp has concluded and the kids had an opportunity to get taught by not only a professional dancer, but also a familiar face.

LJ Jellison, formerly of Fort St. John, and wife Erin-Boyd Jellison currently reside in Las Vegas. Vancouver

dancer Stephanie Sy joined the two and together they taught hip-hop, ballet, pointe, jazz and musical theatre. "He's awesome. The kids just loved him," said Milne of LJ. "He was born and raised here until he was 16. Several of my students have gone on to pursue professional careers – at least for a little while."

NDTS publicity chair Laurie Shuster said it was some-thing special to have LJ instruct at the camp and it sends the proper message to the students that they, too can make it big in the world of dance.

'I think it gives our dancers the opportunity to see that dancers from our small town can go on and pursue their dreams," she said.

Week two of the camp ended last week and was taught instructors Matt Shields from Texas and Jennifer White from Edmonton. The two taught jazz, tap, ballet pointe and contemporary.


'The dancers are (continued) on with technique classes and each group (had) a number choreographed that will go into the competitive season," said Shuster.

as ballet teachers Stephanie Sy and Jennifer White from Vancouver.


